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#### MORE THAN JUST AN OPEN TOMB

Luke 24:1-35; 45-47

24 On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and went to the tomb. <sup>2</sup>They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, <sup>3</sup> but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus. 4 While they were wondering about this, suddenly two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning stood beside them. <sup>5</sup> In their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? <sup>6</sup>He is not here; he has risen! Remember how he told you, while he was still with you in Galilee: <sup>7</sup> 'The Son of Man must be delivered over to the hands of sinners, be crucified and on the third day be raised again.' "8 Then they remembered his words. 9 When they came back from the tomb, they told all these things to the Eleven and to all the others. <sup>10</sup> It was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the others with them who told this to the apostles. 11 But they did not believe the women, because their words seemed to them like nonsense. 12 Peter, however, got up and ran to the tomb. Bending over, he saw the strips of linen lying by themselves, and he went away, wondering to himself what had happened. <sup>13</sup> Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. 14 They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. 15 As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them; 16 but they were kept from recognizing him. <sup>17</sup> He asked them, "What are you discussing together as you walk along?" They stood still, their faces downcast. <sup>18</sup> One of them, named Cleopas, asked him, "Are you the only one visiting Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" 19 "What things?" he asked. "About Jesus of Nazareth," they replied. "He was a prophet, powerful in word and deed before God and all the people. 20 The chief priests and our rulers handed him over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified

him; <sup>21</sup> but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place.

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<sup>22</sup> In addition, some of our women amazed us. They went to the tomb early this morning <sup>23</sup> but didn't find his body. They came and told us that they had seen a vision of angels, who said he was alive. <sup>24</sup> Then some of our companions went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but they did not see Jesus." 25 He said to them, "How foolish you are, and how slow to believe all that the prophets have spoken! <sup>26</sup> Did not the Messiah have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?" <sup>27</sup> And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself. 28 As they approached the village to which they were going, Jesus continued on as if he were going farther. <sup>29</sup> But they urged him strongly, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening; the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. 30 When he was at the table with them, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to them. <sup>31</sup> Then their eyes were <u>opened</u> and they recognized him, and he disappeared from their sight. 32 They asked each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and <u>opened t</u>he Scriptures to us?" <sup>33</sup> They got up and returned at once to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven and those with them, assembled together <sup>34</sup> and saying, "It is true! The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon." 35 Then the two told what had happened on the way, and how Jesus was recognized by them when he broke the bread.

<sup>45</sup>Then he <u>opened</u> their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. <sup>46</sup>He told them, "This is what is written: The Messiah will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, <sup>47</sup> and repentance for the forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem.

Sad. Shattered. Surprised. Scared. Skeptical. There's a lot of this going around us as we shelter in place, rely almost exclusively on online delivery systems of Law and Gospel, and learn in a memorable way how frail we creatures really are. Coronavirus statistics that are current as I write these words may be long forgotten by the time you read them. "The pandemic is accelerating. It took 67 days from the first reported case to reach the first 100,000 cases, 11 days for the second 100,000 and just four days for the third 100,000." More than a little humbling, isn't it?

What a great time for the Easter gospel to be heard and understood. I'm not sure who first brought it to my attention, but I still appreciate the fact that <u>Luke chapter 24</u> starts with the <u>open tomb</u> but continues to employ the word "<u>open</u>" three times in ways that remind us the risen Lord brings us more than an open and empty tomb. And each "opening" provides help to us and others navigating and negotiating life's inevitable traumas.

Despite the open tomb, the disciples on the road to Emmaus remains sad and disoriented. Someone put it this way: "The road to Emmaus was littered with shattered hopes and broken dreams." Initial reports of the empty tomb left the disciples perplexed and confused rather than deliriously happy. Jesus then began to supply what all the disciples needed. He's still doing it among us.

"Then their eyes were <u>opened</u> and they recognized him" (verse 31). The problem was not that they could not see him; it was that they could not recognize him. They simply did not know that it was Jesus. Despite differences between that event on the first Easter Sunday and events in our lives, there are nevertheless similarities. During traumatic times in the journey of life, we can fail to recognize the presence of Jesus with us. It is in such times that our eyes need to be opened to recognize the ongoing reality and intimate presence of him, "God-with-us."

"Were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?" (verse 32) What does the Bible really say regarding realities of life, including the Christian life? Does it promise that our problems will go away before we get to glory? Does it say we will never suffer? Does it suggest immunity from disease or destitution, death or destruction, the devil or demons? Unless the content of Scripture is revealed to us in ways only God can accomplish through his Spirit, our faith can be misguided and our hopes can be misplaced.

We don't know the details, but we observe that Jesus did not just quote a set of isolated texts from the Scriptures. He <u>opened</u> to them the Scriptures as a whole: "And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself" (verse 27). Varying parts of Scripture are drawn together to converge in the center that is Christ himself. The variety of the Old Testament—its laws, history, politics, poetry, and prophecy—are viewed through the lens of the cross and the resurrection.

Then he <u>opened</u> their minds so they could understand the Scriptures (verse 45). The opening of the Bible was accompanied by the opening of their minds. What is given in revelation cannot be grasped without illumination. It is God's will that we mature and experience life more, with our minds opened to gain a greater and richer understanding of God and his ways. In times of distress and discomfort this equips us to pick up broken pieces of our lives and reevaluate them in light of the pattern of the crucified and risen one.

The open tomb, eyes, Scriptures, and minds are gracious gifts of our merciful Lord as he equips us to rest in his promises and relay the same to those around us. Jesus was delivered over to death because of our sins and was raised to life because of our justification (Roman 4:25). The affirmation of our being declared not guilty provides the platform for us to stand firm in the faith and go forth to express love for our God and our neighbor, also during pandemics. Maybe even especially during pandemics, when so many struggle to cope with fear and loneliness.

We understand that the coronavirus plague and civil mandates have significantly impacted the way we live our lives. We also understand that we are and should be living our lives. Now more than ever, that means we are sharing the great news of the OPEN TOMB. May OPEN EYES, SCRIPTURES, and MINDS follow. And may Christ strengthen you and many more through you. Amen.

Dear family at Zion Lutheran,

The other day President Trump and the Center for Disease Control announced the federal recommendation that for the next 15 days everyone is to limit gatherings to no more than 10 people. We encourage everyone to follow these recommendations made by our leaders as they are working to keep us and the people of our country safe. Following these recommendations the leadership (Church Council President, Pastors, and Principal) of Zion has decided to now suspend all scheduled activities at Zion through April 5 and will limit ourselves to no more than 10 people within our building at any one time through that point. This cancellation, then includes all worship services, classes, meetings of more than ten people, dinners, etc.

Why are we doing this? It's not because we are afraid of this disease or of death. In Christ we have all the confidence in the resurrection that is coming and so we have nothing to be afraid of. Instead, the reason we are doing this is love. Love for our government, as we seek to "honor, serve, and obey them, and give them love and respect" (4th Commandment). Love for our neighbor, as we take precautions so that we "do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body, but help and be a friend to him in every bodily need" (5th Commandment). As a congregation, we are called to love God and our neighbor, so we would want to avoid anything that would inadvertently contribute to sickness and loss of life in our community. We also would not want to continue to indiscriminately gather, and in the process give the community the wrong impression that we do not care about it or its well-being, bringing dishonor to the Gospel by our actions.

While love for God's representatives in our government (4th Commandment) and love for your neighbors' physical welfare (5th Commandment) compel us to temporarily suspend worshiping together in person, love for God's Word and worship (3rd Commandment) still compels us to be in God's Word, even if not in the same way. While inperson worship services are cancelled, the pastors will be replacing these services with online videos of the liturgy, hymns, sermon, and prayers. These videos will be posted both on our website (zionmonroe.org) and on our Facebook page. If this letter is reaching you by physical mail and not by email, this means we do not have an email address on record for you. If you have an email address that you have and use, please contact office@zionmonroe.org to be added to our email list so that we can keep you updated that way. Otherwise, for those members who do not use email, if you would like us to send you printed copies of the services and sermons, please call the church office at 734-242-1378 to let us know, and we will be sure to do so.

We also, as always, encourage you to be in the Word daily on your own and as a family. One great way to do so

Pastoral care during this time too has some restrictions it must operate within, but will continue as much as possible. Pastors, like everyone else, are not currently allowed within hospitals, nursing homes, or prisons, with the exception being if someone is considered to be near death. The pastors still can and are still happy to speak over the phone with any members who would like to speak with them. You may call the church office either to talk or leave a message. Additionally, Pastor Daniel Slaughter can be reached at 734-735-0552 or at <a href="mailto:dslaughter@zionmonroe.org">dslaughter@zionmonroe.org</a> and Pastor Ross Ulrich can be reached at 734-240-3888 or at <a href="mailto:rwulrich@zionmonroe.org">rwulrich@zionmonroe.org</a>.

While we can share God's Word over the internet or over the phone, it is not possible to serve the Lord's Supper that way. Private Communion will still be available during this time by appointment for anyone who would like it. Please contact one of the pastors or call the church office to make an appointment.

The pastors will serve as we are able. If either of the pastors comes in contact with someone with the Covid-19 virus, we might need to be quarantined, so we are striving to be faithful and available with wisdom.

To repeat what was said before, these protocols to cancel all scheduled activities and limit the building to 10 occupants are in effect through April 5. As the situation seems to change every day, we have no way of knowing what things will look like after that. We pray that this situation improves quickly and we will be able to meet in person in some form for Holy Week. And we will be watching as things develop and making a decision on that as we get a clearer picture of things.

Finally, having explained how Zion will operate at this time in keeping with the 3rd, 4th, and 5th Commandments, let's also remind ourselves of the 1st Commandment, which tells us to "fear, love and trust in God above all things." This pandemic is serious and we should take it seriously, but we absolutely do not have to be afraid. Jesus is bigger than this pandemic. Jesus is bigger than everything. In him we have all forgiveness, protection, hope, and life. Paul says in Romans 8:31-32, "What then will we say about these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? Indeed, he who did not spare his own Son but gave him for us all—how will he not also graciously give us all things along with him?" And so, even as we try to act wisely and lovingly in this difficult situation, ultimately, as always, we look to him and pray to him and rely on him for everything. With his Word, with his promises, with his care, he will see us through this and through all this life, and none of his people will be lost to him.


